

During our last mobility in Italy of May 2017 the Erasmus Team prepared a CLIL Lesson about glass recycling. We were followed by two Science teachers, Mrs Tanzillo and Mrs Tabarro for the realization of the work. The key point of the lesson was the importance of recycling this material as a great opportunity to help the Earth, because it is in danger due to pollution. We can recycle the glass endlessly. Moreover, we talked about the process of the glass recycling: it is collected, crushed into small pieces (called Cullets) and put in a big oven which heats them at 1500 °C;

the glass becomes liquid that is remodelled and the result is the new shape of the object that we can see. Through glass recycling we can create many work slots, because glass recycling requires large factories, and these, in their turn, require workers. The CLIL Lesson was an interesting experience for many reasons : firstly, it gave us the opportunity to go deep into a very important topic concerning the safeguard of our earth, secondly it was a way to practise English with students from other countries that presented their work and their study on the subject as well. However, what involves us more than everything, is the idea that in Erasmus Project all the students cooperate in order to realize the same objectives and this is a fantastic way to create a solid friendship destined to last very long.



At the end of April, a team of students (Bianca Ilie, Aneta Girlovan, Bogdan Apostol and Ana Spiridon) and teachers (deputy headteacher Cristina Paun and Mihaela Petrache teacher of English) went to Aversa, Italy, in order to attend the "ERASMUS, Biodiversity, - Last chance for future generations! " project meeting. We had to prepare short films, a theatre play and presentations regarding the topic of the meeting: selective collection and disposal of waste. The aim of this activity was to promote the concept of long and sustainable community development and ecological education by involving participating students in selective collection of waste and getting to know and using the experience of more advanced countries in this field. Students and teachers involved had the great opportunity to visit the largest waste incinerator in Europe, in Acerra, a modern facility with a capacity of more than 700,000 tons per year. We also visited the gardens of the Royal Palace of Caserta, a masterpiece of art and beauty, and Vesuvius National Park with the very impressive right - now- sleeping volcano. By taking part in this meeting, students have become more aware of the importance of protecting the natural environment, they have developed abilities and attitudes concerning the respect and responsibility they must show towards nature by civilised behaviour. By working together in international teams, we discovered new and interesting things about environment protection, European laws and regulations regarding sustainable development, we found out about each partner country's environmental issues and made comparisons about the waste collecting systems in the European states involved in the project. We all have become more informed and interested in the cultural dimension of our environment as well as of the importance of the relationship between human behaviour and its consequences on nature.






Our students interviewed some of the teachers involved in the Erasmus+ Project to understand their opinions about the experience. Let's see...

Student : Mrs Costanza Chirico (English Teacher) you are the Erasmus+ Italian Referent. Can you tell us how an Erasmus project is developed? What are the main steps to follow to create a partnership with European schools?

Mrs Chirico : The European project Erasmus+ was born from the necessity felt by the territory and from the EU's priority that are requested to schools. To propose an Erasmus project to EU we have to identify a priority, develop a project idea and, once the main topic is established, find the European schools who have the same interest, same aged students and then fill in a Memorandum of Understanding. After this, working on the official platform of the Erasmus+ official site, the proposal has to be filed and applied.



Student : What are the main difficulties in developing a European project?



Mrs Chirico : The main difficulties are mostly related to the participation of the students in this project. We are mainly concerned in communicating them the idea of what actually a European project is, because it's not just visiting a foreign country on a school trip: the Erasmus+ is so called because it allows us to open our minds and overthrow stereotypes, which is very difficult to understand for students of a certain age.

Student : Talking about your personal experience, what are the main differences you observed in the way to carry out school activities, in the other European schools?

Mrs Chirico : The main differences among teachers from different schools is in the school system but also in the cultural context, which is always interesting to discover. For example, in Turkey, some classrooms were intended to be the places to pray during the day: they are divided by gender, and they provide sinks to 'purify' themselves before praying. With schools in Belgium we found differences for example in sport . Along with other sport activities, they also practice the circus arts because the country has a strong and very old circus tradition, so for them circus is part of the PE lesson. Furthermore, in the Polish school system, high school only lasts three years, so the students that participated in the project could only do it for one year because of the difficulties met in identifying the right age range. In a night school in Latvia , the psychologist is seen as a teacher that works regularly in daily classes and is a supportive figure for the students. The school also provides a sort of kindergarten for the teacher's children, where they can play while their parents are working.



SECOND INTERVIEW

Student : Mrs Elisa de Chiara (English teacher) You're one the teachers in the Erasmus + Project and you are the Support Teacher to the referent Mrs Costanza Chirico. Can you tell us about your personal experience of mobility abroad and the preparation work for mobility?

Mrs Elisa de Chiara : *Before every mobility, the work to prepare is huge. The mobility is preceded annually by a teachers' meeting in one*



of the five participating countries, where the activities are expected to be carried out. Through videoconferences we keep in touch with our European partners and it is a crucial moment as we can exchange ideas and proposals about the program of mobilities. Moreover, the preparation to the mobility in Europe always includes weekly meetings with students of the project in which they are assigned the different tasks to develop concerning CLIL lessons, workshops, billboards, video clips etc. Contemporarily, the other European schools are doing the same. The objective is to combine all of our activities in the same presentation and carry out the work of confrontation about the theme of biodiversity. It goes without saying that the difficulty is greater as the work is organized in English with the supervision of all the English teachers involved.

THIRD INTERVIEW

Students : Mr Pasquale Pagano (English Teacher) you are one of the teachers participants in the project "Erasmus" on Biodiversity and we know that you took part in the mobility to Poland. Can you tell us something about the experience, the activities carried out and about the school context that you met?

Mr Pagano : The experience in Poland was really great and beautiful despite the cold weather but it was ok anyway! The activities were mainly based on visits to National parks and we also had some interesting workshops on the natural elements that is the main topic of our program. It was an overall good experience.



Students : According to you, what is the main impact on young people and on their cultural and personal growth in the partecipation in a program of cooperation with European schools?

Mr Pagano : The cooperation with schools in Europe gives the students the possibility to meet people from foreign countries and especially to experience new cultures, new lifestyles, so it is a great opportunity to get such a wide European vision on lifestyle and culture.



FOURTH INTERVIEW

Students: Mrs Rosa Tabarro (Science Teacher) you are one of the teachers in the partnership Erasmus on biodiversity and you are a science teacher. As science assistant, what is your personal experience in this European program?

Ms Tabarro : According to my personal idea, the project has a great educational value because it gives all the students the opportunity to go deep into the theme of biodiversity, which is a crucial topic for our territory; moreover, the young generations are having the chance to understand not only the problems of our country but also the reality of the European countries that are collaborating with us in this Program.

Students : We know that you took part in the mobility to Huelva, in Spain and you carried out some activites and workshops in the host school. What was your experience like?

Mrs Tabarro : Yes, I took part in the mobility to Spain with four of our students and also to Poland. In Spain we stayed in Huelva where the partner school was situated. We had a week of intense activities ; usually the structure of a mobility is always the same . On the first day we had a visit to the school and the partners presented us all their activities. On the second day there was a visit to a refinery, that is actually the heart of this country, surrounded by a protected area. The theme of the mobility was exactly the study of endangered species and we also had a very interesting Green-Lesson. On the last day the guys illustrated the species that they had identified on panels with pictures and captions.

Student : Mrs Ermelinda Maiolica (English Teacher) you are in the Erasmus Team and we know that you took part in the mobility to Romania and Turkey. Can you tell us something about your experience?

Mrs Maiolica : It was a pleasant experience because the echange with colleagues and foreign students allowed us to learn so much about a different culture. The teachers were very open and friendly towards us and they organized lots of interesting activities ; also the guys were willing to create a dialogue with our guys and to improve their use of the English language . An advantage of the project: Erasmus is a 3 year-old program, which is a very long time that gives us the opportuniity to establish real friendshisp and respect that are also supported by the constant contact we have on the social media.



SIXTH INTERVIEW

Student : Ms Daniela di Palma (English Teacher) you are one of the members in the Erasmus team, can you explain your experience in this project?

Ms di Palma : According to my personal experience, European projects in general have an enormous impact on students. Our school was involved in Comenius also in the past and I can say that the perception of the English language and European context that

They are concretely called to face situations in which they share problems and carry on activities with students from other countries. They are naturally taken to use the language and they forget to be from different nationalities. They are called to a responsibility and they experience the condition of being abroad in a family context and in a different school system... they learn to be a unique community and this is a fantastic way to overcome prejudice and to accept diversity but also to grow up as truly aware European citizens.





As the American scientist Jeannette Wing explains, Computational thinking means " analyzing issues, as a computer technician, algorithmically and at multiple levels of abstraction". So, it is a creative and logic process that allows us to "decompose" a complex problem into different parts to be faced one by one. Finding a solution to each of them means solving the whole problem. The Critical Thinking, instead, is the ability to objectively analyze the information that you already have, evaluate, understand data and experiences in order to reach clear and precise conclusions through three important strategies: Reflecting, Motivating and Finding alternatives. Robert H. Ennis defined it as a "rational thinking focused on deciding what to do and what to think". During the debate, both groups have had interesting arguments to deal with, since the main topic is strictly connected to our school education. The groups introduced the idea of a



"Liquid society", that is "a continuous progress which imposes the necessity to evolve in the best possible way". They questioned how education could prepare people to deal with this society, facing the changes without knowing the problems ahead.



The first objective seemed to be a productive/working society because it assured the achievement of material welfare. After setting the target, decomposing the problem in its parts, solving each part and summarizing them in an only solution, made us overcome the obstacles in the easiest and fastest way to keep up with our frantic society.
